On the agenda: Tom Piatt, of Piatt Associates, will present their proposal to build eight three-bedroom rental apartments and ground-floor commercial space at 719 Washington Street, the former gas station property at the bottom of Roslin Street that is now owned by the City. Piatt received preliminary developer designation from the Department of Neighborhood Development in October; they will be asking for AHA's support when they go before the Board of Appeal later this spring.

A number of local development projects are moving right along. We encourage everyone to attend any or all of the community meetings listed to the right, to ask questions, offer input, and get the latest details.

719 Washington Street

In addition to the presentation at the March 24 AHA meeting, neighbors have two other opportunities to learn about this development proposal. First, the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services has organized a meeting for abutters to hear from the developers on Tuesday, March 22, at 6 p.m., at the Great Hall in Codman Square. Abutters are defined as anyone living within 300 feet of a property, and they will receive direct notification of this meeting, but anyone who is interested is welcome to attend. In addition, the developers will present the project at the Codman Square Neighborhood Council's monthly meeting on Wednesday, April 6, at 7 p.m., also at the Great Hall.

Ashmont TOD2 (Ashmont Tire)

Trinity Financial will hold a community meeting in Peabody Hall at All Saints Church, 209 Ashmont Street, on Thursday, March 31, at 6:30 p.m. Trinity closed in late January on all the financing necessary to construct the project, which includes both rental and condominium apartments, and street-level commercial space, and preliminary work has begun on the site. They plan to go over the project schedule, discuss points of contact for *(continued on page 2)*

construction-related questions, and talk about the plan for local hiring.

Odwin Learning Center

A Boston Redevelopment Authoritysponsored community meeting about the Peregrine Group's plans for the Odwin property, 1943 Dorchester Avenue across from The Carruth, will be held on Monday, April 4, 6:30 p.m., at Epiphany School, 154 Centre Street. Last October the Codman Square Health Center selected Peregrine to be the developer/buyer of its property. The development is required to go through the BRA's Article 80 small project review process, which includes meetings to allow for public input. Peregrine's proposal is for 64 units of entrylevel market-rate rental housing and one street-level commercial space. Epiphany School is next to the Shawmut T station; parking is available at the school.

February Meeting Notes

C-11 Police Report: Three individuals were arrested for the January robbery at Rosario's Market on Talbot Avenue and additional incidents. A 39year-old Dorchester man was arrested in possession of hallucinogenic mushrooms. On February 18 around midnight, two individuals fired multiple shots at several people on Bailey Street, then fled the scene by car with two others. (The targets, who were unharmed, may have been known to the shooters.) Neighbors called in a description of the car, which enabled police to stop the vehicle on Gallivan Boulevard. Ultimately, three guns, ammunition, marijuana, pot, and cocaine were recovered; two of the four people were charged, one of them 15 years old. The C-11 drug control unit observed a drug exchange in the Dunkin Donuts parking lot; the two individuals arrested are both known to police.

Neighbor Nancy Anderson, who is deputy director of the Mayor's Office of Emergency Management, gave out Ready Boston tote bags and radios and discussed OEM's responsibilities, which include working with Metro-Boston Homeland Security, sharing intelligence, training for emergencies, providing shot spotters and police radios, and arranging for emergency shelter. Text 888777 to receive notifications of weather alerts and parking bans.

Vicki Rugo reviewed the status of several local development projects. The Boston Home has received necessary approvals for construction of a free-standing building for independent living for people with MS. A three-story, 18-unit apartment complex at 8 Banton Street has received BRA approval and should start construction by the end of the year. [See page 1 for meetings re: other projects.]

There was more discussion about installing a public toilet on Ashmont Station Plaza. Other types of facilities such as the Portland Loo, just installed in Cambridge, seem preferable, but the City is locked into a contract with the current provider. Ultimately, everyone agreed that the North Plaza was not an appropriate location for any facility. Dave Cotter from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services will pass this view along to Peter O'Sullivan, who is responsible for street furniture in the city.

Dave Cotter encouraged people to participate in upcoming Boston 2030 discussions. David Mooney invited neighbors to suggest topics/speakers for future AHA meetings. Joe Gildea reported that the Ashmont Hill Yard Sale will be held on Saturday, May 21; sign-up details in the next Outlook.
