October Meeting Notes

Nancy Anderson, who works in the Mayor's Office of Emergency Management, handed out emergency radios, which OEM makes available. She encouraged people to sign up for "Alert Boston" to receive emergency notifications; to sign up, call the Mayor's Hotline (617-635-4500), go to www.cityof boston.gov/OEM, or text to 888777 to get the texts. She gave out a "go bag" filled with emergency supplies to one lucky attendee. She also mentioned that pets are welcome in emergency shelters. "Go bags" are available for pets and she will get some for interested neighbors.

C-11 Community Service Officer Mike Keaney observed that Halloween is one of their busiest nights of the year and extra officers will be on board. Incidents in the area in the past month included the discovery of crack in a car that was stopped for speeding; the arrest of the driver and passenger of a car, for drugs; and a series of store robberies that, with the help of security cameras and an observant resident, led to the recovery of the stolen items and the arrest of three perpetrators, all age 17, plus two more, thereby solving five armed robberies. Mike also asked people to pass along the names of any families that are having hard financial times so they can be invited to the C-11 holiday party, which is by invitation only for families in need.

Emily Bryan, principal of the K1-5 Kenny School, which is on Oakton Avenue behind the Adams Street Library, introduced herself and a representative from the school's early childhood program, Countdown to Kindergarten. She invited people to visit and learn more about the school; they are planting a garden and invite the community to participate. They are the only Boston public school with a marching band!

Boston Parks Commissioner Chris Cook attended the meeting, saying he likes to get to know the neighborhoods. He stressed the Mayor's commitment to open space in Boston. He discussed the upcoming \$1.1 million renovation of Roberts Playground, which is across Washington Street adjacent to Tech-Boston Academy. There were some questions about the safety of the crumb rubber turf on the track; he said that they will be posting best practices for people playing on that surface. There was also some discussion about the improvements at Town Field.

AHA Board elections: The current Board members—Lianne Ames, Pat Burson, Charlie Holmes, David Mooney, and Vicki Rugo—were all running for re-election; the floor was opened to nominations and Leo Bray and Shawn Duhamel were nominated. This slate was voted in.
