October Meeting Notes

There was a moment of silence at the start of the meeting to note the passing of Mayor Menino. Lianne Ames, Pat Burson, Charlie Holmes, David Mooney, and Vicki Rugo were elected to the AHA board for the coming year. On the Dot Books, which started as a "pop up" bookstore at this year's Farmers' Market, is now located at Dot2Dot Cafe. Owner Yooree Losordo offers an eclectic mix of books and is happy to order books for you.

C-11 Captain Richard Sexton spoke on several topics of concern to neighbors. House breaks: Daytime breakins have not occurred in a while, but everyone should continue to be vigilant. After a nighttime break-in on Ashmont Street, video at an ATM, the recovery of the homeowners' stolen car, and other forensic evidence led to the arrest of the perpetrator, who lives very nearby. **Kids:** The sometimes problematic behavior on Ashmont Street is also seen in Fields Corner and other sections of Dorchester. A police car is at Ashmont Station every morning and afternoon (late morning on Wednesday); plain clothes and uniformed officers and members of the youth violence task force are also deployed. A juvenile officer works with school administrators. Social media is monitored to identify possible trouble spots. There have not been as many problems with fights as previously. Police try to balance working with the kids and not criminalizing behavior of younger kids. (Keith Love from Tech Boston Academy was unable to attend the meeting, but he will be contacted if student behavior warrants.) Ashmont **Station:** The area sees drug activity because of its easy access; police continue to make frequent drug arrests. BPD works closely with the T police. In the two recent shooting incidents near the station, shooters were caught and arrested within minutes. Cameras are strategically placed in the area and have been useful. Communication: Call 911 for all incidents; call Officer Keaney to report non-emergency/nuisance situations and also for updates on any situation: 617-343-4524. A call to 911 can be anonymous if you request it. "Be nosy." Question someone if

they are unfamiliar. It was suggested that we invite the new Captain at District B-3 (west of Washington Street) to a future meeting.

Matt Zahler and Chris Stanley from Trinity Financial gave an update on the Ashmont Tire Transit Oriented Development of condos, rental units, and retail. Changes have been made to the project based on feedback from the community, the BRA, and the Civic Design Committee. Parking at the rear of the building has been replaced by green space to be used by the residents; additional parking will be gained by the removal of the bus stop in front of the site. Parking garage access will be from Mercier Avenue. Sidewalks will have raised planters, permeable paving, and bump-outs at the corners for pedestrian safety. The building exterior has been refined; entries for owners and tenants are equal in size. Conversations with potential businesses are ongoing for the three retail spaces. Trinity is exploring ways to provide several units for people with neurological diseases. Another year is needed for permitting and finishing the design, with construction taking about 22 months.
