The Ashmont/Peabody Square Farm-
ers' Market begins its seventh season
on Friday, June 26, at 3 p.m., on Ash-
mont Station Plaza, with an official rib-
bon-cutting at 4 p.m. Market hours are
3 to 7 p.m., every Friday through Octo-
ber 16.

New to this year's market is Lanni
Orchards, Inc., from Lunenburg,
founded in 1963 by Pasquale Lanni
and his sons and now operated by third
and fourth generation members of the
Lanni family. They grow their own
apples, peaches, pears, corn, squash,
strawberries, blueberries, raspberries,
and more, and offer other Massachu-
setts-made products as well. In addi-
tion, Dorchester-based Zuki Foods will
be at the market periodically to sell
their "Zuki," made from adzuki, a natu-
rally sweet, low-fat legume originally
from the Himalayas that is turned into
a delicious spread for snacking and

baking. Other vendors will be announced as the season progresses.

Returning vendors include Spring Brook Farm of Littleton, selling fruits, veggies, eggs, honey, preserves, and other items; the very popular Red's Best Seafood, which sells wild-caught seafood sourced directly from the boat; swissbäkers, a family-owned business that offers a tasty selection of breads, cookies, and other bakery items; and Dorchester's own Cedar Grove Gardens, with a selection of fresh flowers, plants, and gifts.

The Farmers' Market accepts credit and debit cards as well as SNAP/EBT. Boston Bounty Bucks will match up to \$10 of produce purchases made with a SNAP/EBT card each week. May Meeting Notes

Mary Beth Alger from Ashmont Hill Chamber Music encouraged neighbors to attend the "Dorchester Rising Stars" concert on Saturday, June 27. Tricia Lampron and Councilor Charles Yancey were unable to attend due to last-minute schedule conflicts.

Tony Stankiewicz from the Codman Square Health Center spoke about the health center's plan to sell the Odwin property on Dorchester Avenue. When the property was purchased in 2010, it was envisioned as a mini-clinic or other satellite space, but the building proved to need extensive repairs and was not ADA-compliant. The focus then shifted to building the addition to the health center's main facility, which had to be done quickly for funding purposes.

Earlier this year, the real estate committee recommended that the Odwin property be sold. Working with a development consultant, the committee considered proposals from 30 potential developers and narrowed the field to two finalists, both of which would pro-

vide 34-36 housing units with ground-floor commercial space that would be partially occupied by the health center. The Codman Square NDC/VietAID proposes to build affordable family housing, and the Peregrine Group proposes to build moderate market-rate housing to appeal to young professionals and empty-nesters, with 5 affordable units as required by law. Presentations are being made to all the neighborhood organizations around Peabody Square to solicit feedback regarding the two options. The real estate committee will meet after the comment period closes (June 7) to review comments, weigh other factors, and make a decision. The developer chosen will then follow the formal community process that is required by the BRA.

In the discussion that followed, questions, issues, and concerns raised by neighbors included the concentration of affordable housing in this part of Dorchester, the desirability of having a balance and diversity of incomes and housing choices, the wish for more neighborhood shops and restaurants and more residents to support them, and the difference in the amount of time it would take to get the project into construction. Tony encouraged everyone to email their comments and concerns to him by June 7.

Susan Garber

Long-time Ashmont Hill neighbor Susan Garber died on May 16 of cardiovascular disease, at the age of 65, just a couple of weeks after she and her husband, Roy Bishop, had relocated to Key West, Florida, a place where Susan had long dreamed of living for its architecture, culture, history, and climate. A native Bostonian and loyal Patriots fan, Susan was director of public art at the Institute of Contemporary Art in the 1970s, managed projects for the City of Boston, the state, and the Boston Redevelopment Authority, and later worked in information technology. Most recently, she volunteered at the Museum of Fine Arts as a guide for visitors with disabilities. In the early 1980s Susan directed the then-fledgling Main Street program of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, which works with local communities to revitalize their traditional commercial districts; our own St. Mark's Area Main Street is a participant in that program. An avid reader, Susan was a founding member of the Ashmont Hill Book Group, which first met in 2007 and has met monthly ever since.

Leaf and Yard Waste Collections

The new schedule for leaf and yard waste for composting continues, with collections on regular trash days the weeks of July 13, August 10, September 14, and October 12. Place leaves and yard debris in large paper bags or open barrels labeled “yard waste;” bundle branches (3’ max. length, 1” max. diameter). No plastic bags; no branches in barrels. **Place at the curb by 7 a.m. on your regular trash day. Leaf and yard waste placed curbside on non-collection days will not be collected.**

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
