January Meeting Notes

C-11 Community Service Officer Michael Keaney reported that 140 kids from needy families attended C-11's Christmas party. Female students from TechBoston were in a fight at Ashmont and Ocean on January 15 and were disciplined according to school policies. Re: the homicide on Washington Street on January 27, Officer Keaney explained that much information must be withheld during an active investigation unless a specific suspect is being sought. C-11 is offering RAD (Rape, Assault, Defense) classes; contact Dario at 617-343-5315. Officer Keaney can be reached 617-343-4524 with questions or concerns.

Andrea Campbell, our new District 4 City Councilor, introduced Caroline Kimball-Katz, who will attend our meetings in Andrea's absence, and Elizabeth (Eli) Pimentel, her new constituent services director. Andrea will be publishing a newsletter, opening a satellite office, and revamping her website. She has been meeting with department heads and commissioners as well as their staffs, attending civic association meetings, and plans to hold meetings of heads of civic associations to talk about common concerns. She was appointed chair of the City Council's Committee on Public Safety and Justice. She is working to get the Community Preservation Act on the ballot, becoming familiar with the City budget, identifying capital projects for the mayor, and planning to visit schools and senior residences in the district. Vicki Rugo gave an update on the Roberts Park play area improvements. The City has budgeted \$800,000 for the play area items, and through the efforts of Rep. Russell Holmes, an additional \$400,000 has been obtained for upgrades to the basketball courts, lighting, walkways and signage. Construction to start this summer. The updated plans from landscape architects CBA Landscape Architects were presented at a community meeting on January 25, and will be posted to the listserve.

David Mooney reported on a discussion at the bi-monthly Ashmont Station Master meeting about the possibility of a public toilet structure being installed in the vicinity of the station. The proposed location is the north plaza. Neighbors felt that that the north plaza was not acceptable, as it is heavily used by the Farmers' Market and other activities. It was also noted that significant maintenance and repair problems have been reported, so that the facilities are often unavailable. The south end of the station was suggested as an alternative. It was also pointed out that restroom facilities inside Ashmont Station are intended for use by the public, but they are unmarked and are only for T customers. They should be identified and made more available. Neighbors are encouraged to contact Peter O'Sullivan, who manages the Street Furniture program, with comments: Peter.O'Sullivan@ cityofboston.gov.

Pat Burson reported on a public safety meeting for parents at TechBoston, organized by school administrators with Boston and Transit police in attendance, to describe how to keep kids safe as they walk through certain neighborhoods. Students are told how to avoid attracting gang attention; street workers also get to know kids before they get involved in problematic behavior. Harley Street neighbor Jessica Descartes, who is the Dean of Discipline at TechBoston and is now the school's liaison to the Ashmont Hill Association, encouraged neighbors to call her at 617-839-9256 with concerns

Ashmont Hill neighbors made up three teams in a community bowling tournament organized by Ashmont Adams neighbor Judy Raup to raise funds for Parkinson's Disease research. The "Welles Swells" received a trophy for the highest score, and the honor of Ashmont Hill was upheld.
