American Soundtrack

On Sunday, October 8, at 4 p.m., Ashmont Hill Chamber Music presents *American Soundtrack*, a celebration of the diverse communities of Dorchester and by extension, many other American communities. The program features the world premiere of Charles Stacy's *Crossroads and Confluences*. Commissioned by AHCM and performed by HUB New Music, the piece

celebrates the geography of Dorchester and four of its major cultural groups: African American, Caribbean, Vietnamese, and Irish. 
