

June Meeting Notes

Many thanks to Bob MacEachern for hosting the meeting.

Councilor Charles Yancey reviewed his legislative history over his 32 years on the City Council. Pending legislation includes a requirement that police vehicles be equipped with defibrilators; legislation is also pending to require them in public buildings. His office number is 617-635-3131 if people have concerns. He did not vote for the recent City budget: there was not enough money for youth mentors and street workers. He also opposed having 7th and 8th graders ride the T to school. A neighbor asked about seeing the Mayor's housing report: where and what types of housing are being built; the report has not yet been presented to the City Council. He thinks microapartments are too small; housing affordability is also a concern. It is important for neighbors to attend hearings about housing. He presented a resolution from the Boston City Council declaring it Vicki Rugo Day. His annual book fair will be on July 25 at the Reggie Lewis Center; 2,000 people attended last year.

The Department of Neighborhood Development is holding a meeting on June 30 in the Great Hall at which the four potential developers for 719 Washington Street will present their proposals. All were encouraged to attend and comment afterwards.

The Ashmont Valley (Fuller/Bailey) Neighborhood Association organized a community meeting on June 24 to discuss the recent shootings in the area. As many as 200 people attended. The Police Commisioner and other BPD representatives spoke. It seemed like a good starting point for getting people to talk together and build community. The Commissioner asked for help in getting replica guns off the street along with small motorized vehicles that are causing problems in the area.

A suggestion was made for a candidates night with joint neighborhood sponsorship; Bobby said he would follow up. The Daily Table is looking for customers. AHA would welcome new board members; speak to David Mooney if you are interested.

A true Renaissance man, in addition to being a musician and founding member of the West End Trio, Mr. Shapiro has a Ph.D. in literature from Columbia University and has taught literature, poetry and music at the Eugene Lang College at

the New School University in New York. He also has published fiction, non-fiction, and poetry. He is donating the concert to support the ensemble's work.
