June Meeting Notes

Thanks to Paul and Megan Sonderegger for hosting the well-attended "ice cream social" meeting on June 22.

C-11 Community Service Officer Mike Keaney reported an arrest by the Youth Violence Task Force on June 20 of a young man on probation wearing an ankle monitor who was followed on social media, located, arrested for an illegal U-turn on Ashmont Street, and found to have a loaded gun. A woman shot on Van Winkle Street is doing OK; the shooting was not random; shehas two children with two different gang members from rival gangs. Sixty kids had a great time at the C-11 Bike Rodeo. National Night Out will be on August 1.

Donna Gittens reported on a meeting neighbors had with Councilor Andrea Campbell, Representative Russell Holmes, and the Unity Club president

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to address concerns about late-night events at the club, which is on Dunbar Avenue just across Washington Street. The club is open until 2 a.m. on weekends, and late partying has created problems, including very loud music, and loud voices, trash, urination in yards, and other disruptions on neighborhood streets where many people park to go to the club. It was proposed that the club have a paid police detail, no activity after 11 p.m., a cleanup plan, a parking plan, and a review of their license regarding capacity; the club is licensed for 600 people and has 20 parking spaces. Licensing issued a noise violation after a Roslin Street neighbor recorded a 85 db level when the allowed limit is 50 db. A future meeting is planned. (Note: Measures that Unity has taken include blocking the bottom of Roslin Street from vehicular access during events and reminding patrons to be considerate of the neighborhood.)

Greater Ashmont Main Street held a visioning session to get people thinking about the assets and challenges of making the district an inviting places for residents, visitors, and businesses. Subsequent small-group discussions are being planning to zero in on the various factors.

There was discussion about 45 Alban Street, where the developers who recently purchased the house had exceeded their building permit to do interior demolition and had removed windows, chimneys, and exterior siding. A stop work order was subsequently issued by Inspectional Services. Dave Cotter from the Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Services reported that an abutters meeting would be scheduled to allow for neighborhood comment in advance of the owners appearing before the Board of Appeal. (Note: The abutters meeting was held on July 13, and a comment period followed. Subsequently, the developers were issued an at-risk permit to continue work on the interior. The Board of Appeal approved the variances on (continued on page 4)

Attendance is free, with food and beverages available for purchase.

Popular with all ages, the Second Line Social Aid and Pleasure Society Brass Band will get the festival off to a lively start at 7 p.m. Headlining the event are The Nephrok! Allstars, with their sets of funk and soul beginning at 7:50 p.m. Food trucks including Jamaica Mi Hungry, Daddy's Bonetown Burgers, Sheherazad Truck, and a sweets truck will offer a variety of tasty dinner options. Dorchester Brewing Company will host their signature beer garden in an age-verified 21+ space, with assorted offerings from Downeast Cider House in East Boston and local wines also available. The Boston cycling and wellness community will be on hand at information tables offering program materials and

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resources, along with other community organizations and Greater Ashmont Main Street with its popular t-shirts, tote bags, and other items.

With the cooperation of the Boston Police Department and the MBTA, a portion of Talbot Avenue, between Dorchester Avenue and Welles Avenue, will be closed to vehicular traffic during the festival to accommodate the food trucks, information tables, and younger cyclists who may want to ride around a bit. (The start time has been set to avoid the rush hour.)

Fall Leaf/Yard Waste Collections

Collection on regular recycling days the weeks of September 18, October 16 & 30, every week in November, and December 4. Put curbside by 7 a.m. on regular recycling day. Place leaves and yard debris in large paper bags or open barrels labeled "Yard Waste." **No plastic bags.** Tie branches with string: 3' max. length, 1" inch max. diameter; no branches in barrels. Note: Yard waste will not be picked up on non-collection weeks.
