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# Smile & Clean Up, Before We Welcome Shoppers!

Let's give Ashmont Hill one last touch-up before the Yard Sale. On Saturday, May 13, at 9 a.m., we'll start off with the annual Ashmont Hill neighborhood photo, and coffee and donuts, at 71 Ocean Street (the Hough/Lind household). Then stick around if you can to help with the Neighborhood Cleanup as part of Boston Shines (now called Love My Block). The City of Boston provides some tools and gloves, but bring your own if you have them. We'll focus on the Alban/Welles and Ashmont/Burt gardens and any other areas that need attention. Or simply clean the curb on your own street. Place trash bags in easy-to-spot locations so Public Works can collect them. (Note: This is a trash cleanup only, not for yard waste.) Bring your family and your neighbors; the more, the merrier!

### **March Meeting Notes**

Bailey Street neighbor Carl Baty talked about a survey that he and others are conducting with local neighborhood groups to see how the built environment impacts health over time. The results will help guide future investments by the Healthy Neighborhoods Equity Fund being created by the Con servation Law Foundation and other partners to invest in high-impact development projects. Copies of the survey were distributed to attendees and the results tallied; the results indicated that health was most impacted by how people had met their own life priorities, and were in keeping with survey results from other local groups.

The executive director of the Martin Richard Foundation spoke. The Foundation, established by Martin's parents after his death in the bombing at the April 15, 2013 Boston Marathon, invests in education, athletics, and community, and has contributed nearly a quarter million dollars in the community. The Foundation is sponsoring One Boston Day in Dorchester on Saturday,

April 15, with a community-wide day of service focused on Dorchester Avenue. (Ed. note: At least 400 people showed up to volunteer.) The Foundation is also spearheading the creation of Martin's Park in the Seaport District near the Children's Museum, which will be designed to be enjoyed and accessible by all; fundraising is underway, with groundbreaking hoped for in June and completion in a year.

An Ashmont Street neighbor expressed concern about ongoing issues with teenage students who are aggressive and destructive. Eli Pimentel from Councilor Campbell's office said she would follow up.

Leslie Jackson from the Ashmont Valley Neighborhood Association reported that the joint Slow Streets application is ready to be submitted tomorrow. The application is very thorough, with an area map, narratives, information on speed checks, and numerous letters of support. It's reported that at least 12 submissions have been received.

Eli Pimentel reported that the Council was beginning to develop guidelines for membership on the committee that will make decisions about Community Preservation Act funds; another issue is under what City department the committee will be placed. The next meeting of the committee on public safety and criminal justice is also coming up.


## Music at Standish Village
