

June 26 Meeting Notes

Thanks very much to Nancy Anderson for hosting the June meeting even before she had officially moved into her new home. Our next AHA meeting will be on Thursday, September 25; watch for details in the next issue of the *Outlook*.

C-11 Community Service Officer Mike Keaney reported on several housebreaks in the immediate neighborhood that involved the theft of electronics, jewelry and other valuables. It is likely that people were ringing doorbells to see if anyone was home and if there was no answer, they looked for a way to break in. Detectives have been investigating, and Captain Sexton has ordered an increased police presence, which may not always be in marked police vehicles. Everyone was encouraged to be aware of their surroundings and call 911 (617-343-4911 from a

cellphone) to report anything at all suspicious; state that the event is "in progress" so it will be made a priority. Two brothers were arrested for the shooting on Bailey Street. Members of the Youth Violence Strike Force found several loaded guns in a car where the occupants were drinking in public.

David Keenan, candidate for Suffolk County Register of Probate, described the wide-ranging responsibilities of the position and his qualifications for the job.

The Department of Neighborhood Development did not accept either of two proposals received for the development of 719 Washington Street, the former gas station property at the bottom of Roslin Street. We heard about one of the proposals at our May meeting. DND is starting the process again.

Representatives from Trinity Financial presented their development proposal for the Ashmont Tire property on Dorchester Avenue between Fuller Street and Mercier Avenue. The proposal calls for a six-story building with 90 apartments and ground-floor retail space. As with The Carruth across the street, which Trinity also developed, the project would be a mix of affordable rental units and market-rate condominiums. The building would have 34 underground parking spaces, 10 behind the building, and 12 on the street in front. The entry lobby would be at the Mercier Avenue end of the building, with the retail focused at the Fuller Street end.

Trinity has signed a purchase-and-sale agreement with the owner of Ashmont Tire and is in a 90-day due diligence period during which they are meeting with community groups and individuals. They have begun the Article 80 process with the Boston Redevelopment Authority, which addresses the impacts that a development might have on the community, and are filing documents for necessary permits and variances. Future meetings will be scheduled to continue the conversation


Dot Open Studios 2014 Registration Now Open

Gene Navias

The Rev. Eugene B. Navias, a lifelong Unitarian and ordained minister, moved to 69 Ocean Street—one of Ashmont Hill's original 1870s Mansard "cottages"—in 1985. He died on August 17, at the age of 86, at Rogerson House in Jamaica Plain, where he had been cared for as his Alzheimer's worsened. Gene was an engaged neighbor throughout the years: he hosted AHA meetings and parties, helped with neighborhood cleanups, enjoyed the Yard Sale and Movable Feast, and also opened his beautifully furnished home for the Codman Square House Tour. Gene shared his life and his home with his partner Stanley Moss and later, after Stan's death from cancer in 2000, with Jim Buckley, who was supportive of Gene throughout his illness. (Jim has made his own contributions to the neighborhood as a member of the AHA board and, more recently, of the St. Mark's Area Main Street board.) The AHA board sends its sympathies to Jim and to Gene's family on behalf of the neighborhood. A memorial service for Gene will be held on Sunday, October 5, at 1 p.m., at Arlington Street Church.

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with the community. Ashmont Tire will remain open for a year; the new building would be completed in 2017 if permitting goes according to plan. Trinity Management, which currently manages about 5,000 housing units including The Carruth, would manage this building as well.

Questions and comments from the group related to traffic, parking, the type of retail that would be desirable, handicapped accessibility, energy efficiency, car-sharing, the possibility of artists' housing, the possibility of community space, and similar issues.

Note: Subsequent to the June AHA meeting, Trinity held a community-wide meeting on July 21 at the Carney Hospital at which they presented an initial architectural concept for the building as well as preliminary floor plans, talked in more detail about the various aspects of the development, and took numerous questions and comments. Another community-wide meeting will be scheduled soon as part of the BRA's Article 80 process; this meeting will also be widely advertised.
